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History

The Henry Wood Booth Papers document the early history of the Booth family and of Cranbrook, the estate of George Gough Booth in Bloomfield Hills, Michigan. Henry Wood Booth is the father of George Gough Booth, from 1906 until 1929 the president of the *Detroit News* and until 1946 the president of Booth Newspapers. George Booth, with his wife Ellen Scripps Booth, founded religious, educational, and civic institutions at Cranbrook beginning in 1915.

Henry Wood Booth was born in the village of Cranbrook, England, on January 21, 1837, the son of coppersmith Henry Gough Booth and Harriet Wood. At age five, his mother died and his father immigrated to America with his three children.

The family lived for periods in Cincinnati, Ohio; Toronto, Ontario; and Buffalo, New York before returning to England to set up a metalworking shop in 1850. A year later they again set sail for America and took up residence in Saint Catharines, Ontario.

At age seventeen, Henry Wood Booth met Claria Louise Irene Gagnier, the eldest daughter of Charles Gagnier and Maria Martel Gagnier, also of St. Catharines. They were married at Trinity Curch inToronto on May 18, 1858. Henry and Claria had ten children: Charles Henry, Alice Martel, Grace, George Gough, Edmund Wood, Theodora Marianne, Adelaide Clara Louise, Ralph Harman, Roland Bucer, and Bertha Beatrice.

By the age of twenty, Henry Wood Booth was active in temperance work, publishing the first of several news and temperance papers with which he was involved. At the same time Henry also worked for winegrowers in the state of New York, who adopted his suggestion of distilling cheap brandy from wine furnished with extra sugar.

In 1873, at the age of 36, Henry became interested in the Reformed Episcopal Church movement. In 1874, he began publishing the *Sunday Times* in Toronto. The paper failed to gain acceptance and subsequently ceased publication.

Henry Wood Booth was a prolific writer and speaker. His articles were published in the *Detroit News* as a religious page called "Peregrinations of a Church Tramp" and he spoke at many Detroit area churches. Out of this experience came his unsuccessful attempt to revive the practice of family prayer through the "Bell, Book and Candle Society."

Henry Wood Booth was also an inventor and had a United States patents commission during the years 1875-1887. His inventions included Ka-O-Ka, a coffee substitute, and a ventilated coffin.

Henry Wood Booth became an American citizen on 11 September 1911 and spent his last twenty years living in "The Cottage" at Cranbrook, the estate of his son George in Bloomfield Hills, Michigan, building rock gardens and paths,

studying, and writing. Henry Wood Booth died on 17 March 1925; his wife Clara Louise Gagnier Booth died on 1 April 1930.

Scope and Content of Collection

The Henry Wood Booth Papers includes material documenting his family history and his various professional, spiritual, and intellectual pursuits. Of particular interest are his autobiography, *Life of Henry Wood Booth*, and his *Annals of Cranbrook*, both of which contain a variety of photographs, news articles and publications in addition to Booth's handwritten manuscript.

The Henry Wood Booth Papers have been subdivided into six series: BIOGRAPHICAL, PERSONAL, WRITINGS, BOOKS, PHOTOGRAPHS, and REALIA.

The BIOGRAPHICAL series (1814-1950; 1 linear ft.) contains family chronologies, genealogical material, family documents, obituaries, tribute materials, historic materials relating to Cranbrook, an interview of Henry Wood Booth, the *Life of Henry Wood Booth*, and the *Annals of Cranbrook*.

The PERSONAL series (1814-1930; 2.5 linear ft.) contains material related to the Bell, Book and Candle Society, a small amount of business records, collected family letters, collected bible prayers, a diary, notebooks relating to Booth's temperance research and to the mechanical trades, several scrapbooks and his will.

The WRITINGS series (1855-1924; 2 linear ft.) contains the writings of Henry Wood Booth, including manuscripts, newspaper articles and publications.

The BOOKS series (1878-1899; 0.5 linear ft.) contains four books owned by Booth, all of which contain marginal commentaries by him.

The REALIA series (1853-1869, chiefly n.d.; 1 linear ft.) contains Booth family memorabilia.

The PHOTOGRAPHS series (1866-1890; 1 envelope) includes photographs of newspaper advertisements of Booth's as well as two small portraits of Henry Wood Booth. For more pictures of Henry Wood and Clara Louise Gagnier Booth and their family, see the Estate photograph albums in the Cranbrook Archives.
