Question: What is your definition of sustainability? Sustainability to me is using the resources we have today in a conservative way, so we make those resources last as long as possible, protect wildlife habitats and natural places.

Question: How are you making a difference at Cranbrook Institute of Science?

Answer: Through my position at Cranbrook Institute of Science, I have an opportunity to help fuel my passion while impacting the lives of thousands of people each year. Some of our team accomplishments at Cranbrook and beyond:

Rouge River Water Festival

- Established 2003: served over 35,000 teachers and students.

Water on the Go!

- Established 2007: served over 105,000 teachers and students.

Special Events and Programs

- Engaged over 160,000 teachers, students and museum visitors.

Water Heritage Traveling Great Lakes Exhibition

- Debuted in 2018, the exhibition visited seven communities and engaged over 20,000 individuals throughout Michigan.

Great Lakes Field Ecology Course

- First offered in the Summer of 2019 this graduate level course led students from Johns Hopkins University on a 10-day field course that provided students with a first-hand opportunity to immerse themselves in the system, interact with individuals involved in monitoring, education, policymaking, threat management, advocacy and governance.

Cranbrook Schools - What's New! Tray-less Dining Initiative

Staying consistent with Cranbrook's Green awareness, the schools have begun the process of going tray-less in the middle and upper schools. "The facts sell the initiative" says Allison Mitchell, Chartwells General Manager. On a typical day, we estimate that 470 gallons of water are used to wash trays from the dining halls. There are chemicals, detergents, drying agents, energy and labor that all go into the washing of trays. The benefits of eliminating trays are environmentally impactful.

The initiative was rolled out to students, faculty and staff upon return from the Thanksgiving break. Trays were not eliminated but signs were put into place stating, "the choice is yours...consider not using a tray." Almost immediately, there was a 50% reduction in tray use. The "ultimate plan" would be to become completely tray-less. Encouraging the schools' community to lessen the ecological footprint is rewarding for all.

Brookside School: Recycle Your K-Cup Pods Here

Brookside School continues to practice K-Cup recycling. The next time you are at Brookside, check out the Recycle Your K-Cup Pods.

We are excited to share a few links to the Keurig company statement -that all their pods will be fully recyclable by the end of 2020 and the link to a company-Grounds to Grow On, that you can pay to recycle pods for you. The cost starts at \$70 to recycle 875 pods.
